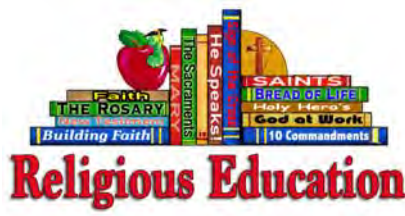

The Theological Virtues

This month, we will review the virtues that relate directly to God – The Virtues of Faith, Hope and Charity (Love). We cannot acquire these through our own human effort but only through God. These virtues are given to us from God beginning with our Baptism. These gifts dispose us to live in relationship with God. These virtues also influence the Cardinal (human) Virtues by increasing their stability and strength in our lives. Growth in these virtues is very important for every Christian, as they aid us in living out our Christian moral life.

As we learned in our last series on the Cardinal Virtues, virtue is the habitual and firm disposition to do good. The virtues of Faith, Hope and Charity inform all the Cardinal Virtues and give life to them (CCC, nos. 1833, 1834, 1841).

Faith is the theological virtue by which we believe in God and all that he has said and revealed to us. Faith is our personal response to God's revelation of his holiness, love, beauty and transcendence. By faith, men and women seek to know and do God's will. The Catechism tells us that we must not only keep the faith and live on it, but also profess it, confidently bear witness to and spread our faith (CCC 1816). Faith is a gift of grace from God. And is constantly nourished by the Holy Spirit from the moment of Baptism, through our prayer life, our participation in the Eucharist and the Sacraments and by our Christian witness.

Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of Heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit. (CCC 1817). Hope fills us with the confidence that God is with us and guides us to life with him. Hope responds to the aspiration to happiness which God has placed in the heart of everyone. Hope sustains us in times of abandonment and keeps us from being discouraged. Hope opens our hearts in expectation of eternal peace. St. Teresa of Avila wrote:

Hope, O my soul, hope. You know neither the day nor the hour. Watch carefully, for everything passes quickly, even though your impatience makes doubtful what is certain, and turns a very short time into a long one. Dream that the more you struggle, the more you prove the love that you bear your God, and the more you will rejoice one day with your Beloved, in a happiness and rapture that can never end.

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Charity (Love) is the greatest virtue. This virtue is the one by which we love God above all things for his own sake, and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God (CCC 1822). God asks us to accept this love and respond to him with it. Jesus made the love of God the first of the two greatest Commandments. The Gospel of Matthew tells us that Jesus said: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind". In the Gospel of John, Jesus told his disciples: "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love" and then he goes on to say "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. It is through living this love that we can keep God's commandments. The fruits of Charity/Love are joy, peace and mercy. St. Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians:

"charity is patient and kind, charity is not jealous or boastful; it is not arrogant or rude. Charity does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong, but rejoices in the right. Charity bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things".

It is through charity, that all virtues are lived and shared. With love, all is possible in Christ.

The Autumn Season

October usually is an enjoyable time of the year in the United States. The autumn season manifests itself with **wonderful fall foliage** in many parts of the country. The temperatures are cooler, inviting people outdoors for nature walks, apple or pumpkin picking. School routines are more established and football season is in full swing. The celebrations of the Church for the month of October are also wonderful and unique. The feasts of some of the most popular saints of the universal Church are celebrated during this month: St. Therese the Little Flower (France), St. Francis of Assisi (Italy) and St. Teresa of Avila (Spain). These saints come from different countries, and in honoring these saints we can include cultural dishes or activities from each country to make the feast day even more special. Read more about the lives of these saints. Perhaps the family can pick one virtue that each saint practiced well and try to implement it.

Guardian Angels



Angels are servants and messengers from God. "Angel" in Greek means messenger. In unseen ways the angels help us on our earthly pilgrimage by assisting us in work and study, helping us in temptation and protecting us from physical danger.

The idea that each soul has assigned to it a personal guardian angel has been long accepted by the Church and is a truth of our faith. From the Gospel of today's liturgy we read: "See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father" (Matthew 18:10). The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that "the existence of the spiritual, non-corporeal beings that Sacred Scripture usually calls 'angels' is a truth of faith (328)." From our birth until our death, man is surrounded by the protection and intercession of angels, particularly our guardian angel: "Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life (336)." The Church thanks God for our helpers, the angels, particularly on this feast day and September 29 which is the feast of Saint Michael, Saint Gabriel, and Saint Raphael, archangels. Today's feast appeared in Spain during the sixteenth century. It was extended to the universal Church and made obligatory in 1670.

Be alert in your every action as one should be who is accompanied by angels in all your ways, for that mission has been enjoined upon them. In whatever lodging, in whatever nook or corner you may find yourself, cherish a reverence for your guardian angel. In his presence do not dare to do anything you would not do in mine. Or do you doubt his presence because you do not see him? Would it really help if you did hear him, or touch him, or smell him? Remember, there are realities whose existence has not been proven by mere sight.

Brethren, we will love God's angels with a most affectionate love; for they will be our heavenly co-heirs some day, these spirits who now are sent by the Father to be our protectors and our guides. With such bodyguards, what are we to fear? They can neither be subdued nor deceived; nor is there any possibility at all that they should go astray who are to guard us in all our ways. They are trustworthy, they are intelligent, they are strong — why, then, do we tremble? We need only to follow them, remain close to them, and we will dwell in the protection of the Most High God. So as often as you sense the approach of any grave temptation or some crushing sorrow hangs over you, invoke your protector, your leader, your helper in every situation. Call out to him and say: Lord, save us, we are perishing. —St. Bernard

St. Therese of Lisieux

Marie Therese Martin was born at Alencon, France on January 2, 1873, the youngest of five daughters. Her father, Louis, was a watchmaker, and her mother, Zelig, who died of breast cancer when Therese was four, was a lace maker. She was brought up in a model Christian home. While still a child she felt the attraction of the cloister, and at fifteen obtained permission to enter the Carmel of Lisieux. For the next nine years she lived a very ordinary religious life. There are no miracles, exploits or austerities recorded of her. She attained a very high degree of holiness by carrying out her ordinary daily duties with perfect fidelity, having a childlike confidence in God's providence and merciful love and being ready to be at the service of others at all times. She also had a great love of the Church and a zeal for the conversion of souls. She prayed especially for priests. She died of consumption on September 30, 1897, at the age of 24, and was canonized in 1925. She has never ceased to fulfill her promise: "I will pass my heaven in doing good on earth." Her interior life is known through her autobiography called *Story of a Soul*. Pope Saint John Paul II declared her a Doctor of the Church in 1997.

In more recent times, St. Therese of Lisieux shows us the courageous way of abandonment into the hands of God to whom she entrusts her littleness. And yet it is not that she has no experience of the feeling of God's absence, a feeling which our century is harshly experiencing: "Sometimes it seems that the little bird (to which she compared herself) cannot believe that anything else exists except the clouds that envelop it.... This is the moment of perfect joy for the poor, weak little thing.... What happiness for it to remain there nevertheless, and to gaze at the invisible light that hides from its faith."

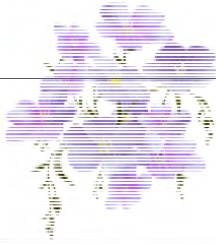

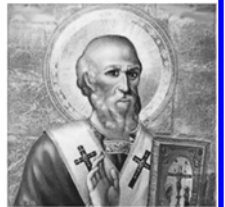
