from the Deacon's Desk...

Greetings all! I hope this finds you all well and coping with all that is going on around us. A lot has happened since last month. One of the things that happened and one I'll not soon forget is I spent my 60th birthday in quarantine! My family had planned a grand surprise 60th birthday bash for me but it just couldn't happen. The reason for the quarantine was because I came in contact with someone who had tested positive. Everyone I came in contact with are fine. I was tested, and tested negative and as of this writing, I am completing my 14 day quarantine. During the exposure, we were both masked up and practicing social distancing. In spite of this, however, we still had to take the necessary precautions. I can not stress enough the importance of masks and social distancing! As soon as the quarantine is over, I'll be back.

That all being said, this month I'd like to continue my thoughts on **Catholic Social Teaching**. These teachings are so important to us now more than ever. In the coming months, I will expand on one of the seven themes in CST beginning with the first one:

Theme 1: Life And Dignity of the Human Person

"The Catholic Church proclaims that human life is sacred and that the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. This belief is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching. In our society, human life is under direct attack from abortion and euthanasia. The value of human life is being threatened by cloning, embryonic stem cell research, and the use of the death penalty. The intentional targeting of civilians in war or terrorist attacks is always wrong. Catholic teaching also calls on us to work to avoid war. Nations must protect the right to life by finding increasingly effective ways to prevent conflicts and resolve them by peaceful means. We believe that every person is precious, that people are more important than things, and that the measure of every institution is whether it threatens or enhances the life and dignity of the human person."

We learn from Scripture that human beings are created "in the image and likeness of God." This theme helps us understand this and calls on everyone to preserve the dignity of all human life from conception to natural death. As Catholics, we are called to be involved in a broad range of issues including but not limited to:

- Preventing abortion and euthanasia
- Ending the death penalty
- ♦ Fair treatment for those with disabilities
- Promoting civil rights and equality for those of different races, genders, ages, quality of health and income levels
- ♦ Ending poverty
- ♦ Avoiding war
- Preventing cloning or embryonic stem cell research

In the fight for human life and dignity two saints come to mind:

- St. Peter Claver, the patron saint of slaves was a Spanish Jesuit priest who ministered to and affirmed the worth of African slaves in Colombia
- St. Teresa of Calcutta needs no introduction. Her tireless work affirming the dignity of the poorest of the poor and most destitute in India is a reminder to us all of the pain and suffering around us even if we don't see it.

St. Faustina Kowalska, Virgin

Saint Faustina was born in the 20th century, and canonized in the year 2000. Jesus chose her to deliver to the modern world a message as old as eternity. It is the message of his love for all people, especially sinners. Jesus said to Faustina, "Today I am sending you with my mercy to the people of the whole world." It is his desire to heal the aching world, to draw all people into his merciful heart of love.

On February 22, 1931, Jesus appeared to Faustina as the King of Divine Mercy. He asked her to have a picture painted of him as she saw him — clothed in white, with red and white rays of light streaming from his heart. The rays represent the blood and water that flowed



from the side of Jesus on the cross. Under the image are the words, "Jesus, I trust in you."

Many people did not believe Faustina at first. The sisters in her own convent thought that Jesus could not possibly have selected her for this great favor. After all, she was an uneducated peasant girl. Her superiors often refused to give her permission to carry out Jesus' requests. Church theologians, too, doubted her word. Jesus told Faustina that he loved her obedience and that his will would be done in the end.

In June 1934 an artist completed the painting of the Divine Mercy according to her instructions; and it soon became a focus for devotion. Faustina continued to record in her diary the appearances of Jesus. The diary was translated into English and published in 1987 with the title Divine Mercy in My Soul.

Faustina, baptized Helena, had grown up in a poor Polish family of 10 children. When she was 15 years old, she quit school in order to work as a housemaid to help support her family. By the time she was 18, she was sure that God was calling her to a religious life, but her parents objected. So she tried to put it out of her mind. But one night, while the lively polka music was playing at a village dance, Helena saw Jesus, sad and suffering. The very next day she packed a small bag and went to the capital city of Warsaw to join the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. There she received the name Sister Mary Faustina.



About 10 years later, Faustina contracted tuberculosis. Soon she was too weak to manage the heavy gardening assigned to her. So she was given the job of gatekeeper. She was able to show mercy to the poor people who came to the convent looking for food. Once Jesus came to the door as a poor young man. After he had eaten the soup and bread Faustina gave him, she recognized him. Jesus told her he had come to experience with great joy her tender love and mercy.

Faustina was canonized by the first Polish pope, John Paul II, on April 30, 2000. The first Sunday after Easter was declared Divine Mercy Sunday.

Memorial of Guardian Angels

Each person on Angels has a guardian angel who watches over him and helps him to attain his salvation. It has been a common theological opinion that this angelical guardianship begins at the moment of birth; prior to this, the child would be protected by the mother's guardian angel. But this is not certain, and since we now know that the soul is infused at the moment of conception, it may be that the angelic guardianship also begins at that moment. In any case, this protection continues throughout our whole life and ceases only when our probation on earth ends, namely, at the moment of death. Our guardian angel accompanies our soul to purgatory or heaven, and becomes our coheir in the heavenly kingdom.

Guardian Angels

Angels are servants and messengers from God. "Angel" in Greek means messenger. In unseen ways the angels help us on our earthly pilgrimage by assisting us in work and study, helping us in temptation and protecting us from physical danger.

The idea that each soul has assigned to it a personal guardian angel has been long accepted by the Church and is a truth of our faith. From the

Gospel of today's liturgy we read: "See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father" (Matthew 18:10). The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that "the existence of the spiritual, non-corporeal beings that Sacred Scripture usually calls 'angels' is a truth of faith (328)." From our birth until our death, man is surrounded by the protection and intercession of angels, particularly our guardian angel: "Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life (336)." The Church thanks God for our helpers, the angels, particularly on this feast day and September 29 which is the feast of Saint Michael, Saint Gabriel, and Saint Raphael, archangels. Today's feast appeared in Spain during the sixteenth century. It was extended to the universal Church and made obligatory in 1670.

Be alert in your every action as one should be who is accompanied by angels in all your ways, for that mission has been enjoined upon them. In whatever lodging, in whatever nook or corner you may find yourself, cherish a reverence for your guardian angel. In his presence do not dare to do anything you would not do in mine. Or do you doubt his presence because you do not see him? Would it really help if you did hear him, or touch him, or smell him? Remember, there are realities whose existence has not been proven by mere sight.

Brethren, we will love God's angels with a most affectionate love; for they will be our heavenly co-heirs some day, these spirits who now are sent by the Father to be our protectors and our guides. With such bodyguards, what are we to fear? They can neither be subdued nor deceived; nor is there any possibility at all that they should go astray who are to guard us in all our ways. They are trustworthy, they are intelligent, they are strong — why, then, do we tremble? We need only to follow them, remain close to them, and we will dwell in the protection of the Most High God. So as often as you sense the approach of any grave temptation or some crushing sorrow hangs over you, invoke your protector, your leader, your helper in every situation. Call out to him and say: Lord, save us, we are perishing. —St. Bernard

Prayer Before Mass:

Pope: Pre-Mass Time Is Meant for Silent Prayer, Not Chitchat Prayer is, 'first and foremost dialogue, a personal relationship with God,' Francis said.

VATICAN CITY — On Wednesday, Pope Francis called out the common habit of chatting with people before Mass, stressing that this is a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord.

"When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us," the Pope said Nov. 15. **However, "it is not a moment for chitchat."**

"It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus," he said, adding that "silence is so important."

Continuing his new catechesis on the Eucharist, the Pope recalled his message the week prior, that the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

But to really understand this, first we have to answer a question, he said. And that is: What is prayer?

Prayer is, "first and foremost dialogue, a personal relationship with God," he said. And in prayer, just like in any dialogue, it needs moments of silence "together with Jesus." This, he said, is because it is only in the "mysterious silence of God" that his word can resound in our hearts.

Francis explained that prayer is something that Jesus himself taught us to do, first of all by example, when in the Gospels he withdraws to a secluded place to pray. And second, he teaches us again when he tells his disciples that the first word in knowing how to pray is "Father."

This is "so simple," the Pope said. "So we have to learn 'Father." Then we must take on the attitude of a small child, one full of trust and confidence, knowing that God "remembers you and takes care of you," he said.

The second attitude we should take is one of childlike surprise and wonder. The child, he said, "always asks a thousand questions because he wants to discover the world; in our relationship with the Lord, in prayer," he said, "open the heart to wonder."

He noted that many say they don't have time to pray. "We lose sight of what is fundamental: our life of the heart, our spiritual life, our life of prayer with the Lord."

However, Jesus surprises us in truth by loving us and calling us even in our weaknesses, he said, adding that just as Christ called his disciples, he also calls us to him at each Mass.

"This is, therefore, the greatest grace: to be able to experience the Mass, the Eucharist. It is the privileged moment to be with Jesus, and through him, with God."

The Mysteries of the Rosary

The Church has used three sets of mysteries for many centuries. In 2002 Pope John Paul II proposed a fourth set of mysteries—the Mysteries of Light, or Luminous Mysteries. According to his suggestion, the four sets of mysteries might be prayed on the following days: the Joyful Mysteries on Monday and Saturday, the Sorrowful Mysteries on Tuesday and Friday, the Glorious Mysteries on Wednesday and Sunday, and the Luminous Mysteries on Thursday.

The Joyful Mysteries—Monday—Saturday

- 1. **The Annunciation**—Mary learns that she has been chosen to be the mother of Jesus.
- 2. **The Visitation**—Mary visits Elizabeth, who tells her that she will always be remembered.
- 3. The Nativity—Jesus is born in a stable in Bethlehem.
- 4. **The Presentation**—Mary and Joseph take the infant Jesus to the Temple to present him to God.
- 5. The Finding of Jesus in the Temple—Jesus is found in the Temple discussing his faith with the teachers.

The Mysteries of Light—Thursday (also known as Luminous Mystery)

- 1. The Baptism of Jesus in the River Jordan—God proclaims that Jesus is his beloved Son.
- 2. The Wedding Feast at Cana—At Mary's request, Jesus performs his first miracle.
- 3. **The Proclamation of the Kingdom of God**—Jesus calls all to conversion and service to the Kingdom.
- 4. The Transfiguration of Jesus—Jesus is revealed in glory to Peter, James, and John.
- 5. The Institution of the Eucharist—Jesus offers his Body and Blood at the Last Supper.

The Sorrowful Mysteries—Tuesday—Friday

- 1. **The Agony in the Garden**—Jesus prays in the Garden of Gethsemane on the night before he dies.
- 2. The Scourging at the Pillar—Jesus is lashed with whips.
- 3. **The Crowning With Thorns**—Jesus is mocked and crowned with thorns.
- 4. The Carrying of the Cross—Jesus carries the cross that will be used to crucify him.
- 5. The Crucifixion—Jesus is nailed to the cross and dies.

The Glorious Mysteries—Wednesday—Sunday

- 1. **The Resurrection**—God the Father raises Jesus from the dead.
- 2. **The Ascension**—Jesus returns to his Father in heaven.
- 3. The Coming of the Holy Spirit—The Holy Spirit comes to bring new life to the disciples.
- 4. The Assumption of Mary—At the end of her life on earth, Mary is taken body and soul into heaven.
- 5. The Coronation of Mary—Mary is crowned as Queen of Heaven and Earth.

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


Oct. 1- Saint Therese of Lisieux

This film tells the story of her life and message, intertwined with the personal stories of twelve people from around the world who testify to the great impact Thérèse has made on their lives.


Oct. 7-The Seven Sorrows of The Blessed Virgin Mary

Oct. 9-Blessed John Henry Newman



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


